The second half of the term we will go through his book *Shadows of Syntax* chapter by chapter, and look at some related work of others as time permits.

Ayer (1936) "The A Priori" from Language, Truth, and Logic, the first summary account of logical positivism or empiricism in English, containing a summary of what is (or of one thing that is) called "conventionalism", echoed by many others at the time, repudiated by most, including Ayer himself by 50 years later.
